This was a second year in which the COVID-19 pandemic impacted our work. Yet, given our timely transition to conducting activities via Zoom, we maintained consistent progress toward all of our goals throughout the year. From our core grant funding, WIND leveraged \$4,061,664 in additional funds from federal grants, state contracts, fees for services, and private donations. The Wyoming Developmental Disabilities Network identified several critical issues and/or barriers that affect individuals with developmental disabilities in our state. These include potential abuse and neglect, service provider training needs, guardianship and representative payee concerns, inadequate potential for addressing the aging needs of individuals with developmental disabilities and an aging workforce. We deemed two emerging issues to be the most urgent: assuring the needs of individuals with developmental disabilities are met during the pandemic and proposed changes in waiver services resulting from state budget reductions.

The Wyoming Developmental Disability Network directors met several times to discuss our concerns about significant proposed budget reductions to the Wyoming Department of Health and the Wyoming Medicaid waivers. We discussed several approaches and determined our efforts would be best spent increasing the awareness of families and providers about the potential impacts of the budget reduction. Prior to the budget concerns, the directors met several

times to discuss the impacts of COVID-19 on individuals with developmental disabilities in Wyoming. We sent a letter to the director of the Wyoming

Department of Health, requesting that vaccination priority status be granted to individuals with developmental disabilities, their family members, and their care

providers. We also discuss collaboration for the use of our individually

awarded vaccination funding.

*a. Issue/Barrier

*b. Provide a brief description of the collaborative strategies to address issue/barrier and expected outcome(s):

We collaborated with a family, a case manager, a service providing agency, and the states service provider organization to deliver two distance panel discussions on January 26 and 27, 2021. Our objectives were to provide a history of the Wyoming Developmental Disability Network, the waiver program in Wyoming, and the budget process as well as to identify the potential impacts on services for one specific client should the waiver changes be imposed and provide guidance on strategic advocacy. We anticipated that some families and providers would attend and perhaps share the information they learned with others, resulting in a strong advocacy effort to maintain appropriate waiver services for individuals with developmental disabilities in Wyoming. Resulting from the statewide advocacy efforts of families and service providers after the panel discussions, the service changes were withdrawn from the proposed budget reductions. Services that had been eliminated just months prior to the panel discussions were also reinstated. Related to the COVID vaccinations, we anticipated that individuals with developmental disabilities would be included in high priority groups which was the successful result of these collaborations.

Include any technical assistance expertise you can provide to other States in this area | The Wyoming Institute for Disabilities proposed then coordinated and facilitated the two forums via Zoom, designed to inform individuals with developmental disabilities, their family members, and caregivers about the potential impacts of state budget reductions on developmental disability waiver services. The use of the Zoom platform and our ECHO distance education modality allowed us to identify the approach, communicate with families and providers then deliver the distance discussions all in three weeks. Aligned with our national training initiative work, Project SCOPE, WIND remains adept at providing technical assistance for other UCEDDs to integrate the ECHO Model for statewide training and technical assistance. |
| *e. Briefly identify problems encountered as a result of this collaboration, and technical assistance, if any, desired | There were no problems related to this collaboration. |
| *f. Describe any unexpected benefits of this collaborative effort | There were two unexpected benefits of the collaboration addressing the proposed budget reductions. First, while we anticipated we might have a dozen or so people for each panel discussion, we had over 100 attendees at the first evening session and an additional 100 at the second lunch session. The second unexpected benefit was the establishment of a sustainable venue, webpage, process, expertise, and network to address future or emerging concerns that have the potential to impact Wyoming individuals with developmental disabilities and their families. |
