ADED, a nonprofit association, is the primary professional organization in this specialized area, and stands ready to meet professional needs of its members through educational conferences and research support as well as encouraging equipment development to maximize the transportation options for persons with disabilities.

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Fostering Self-Determination Among Children and Youth with Disabilities – Ideas from parents for parents
