

- The "r" word movement brought together self-advocates
- I'm Determined project through the VA Department of Education develop self-determination skills in students
- Projects of National Significance at the University Center of Excellence for Developmental Disabilities have laid the foundation for self-advocacy initiatives
- Youth Leadership Forum Alumni have taken leadership roles in Virginia
- Positive relationships between the Developmental Disabilities Council and University Center of Excellence to promote self-advocacy efforts statewide and locally
- Youth with disabilities advocated for Disability History and Awareness Month in Virginia
- Newly formed cross disability self-advocacy organization

Challenges for Self-Advocates in Virginia


- Self-advocacy initiatives that are run by people with disabilities
- Develop a common message among the self-advocacy groups
- Control of funding both internal and external
- Figuring out social networking to enhance self-advocacy across the state
- Lack of :
 - Funding
 - Transportation to attend meetings
 - Coordination with self-advocacy groups and youth with disabilities
 - Knowledge about self-advocacy groups in their local area
 - Support from organizations

Success in Self-Advocacy in Virginia

- Develop the next generation of leaders with disabilities through I'm Determined and YLF
- The R-Word campaign led by The Arc resulted in general assembly action and renaming of state DD agency
- Successful in obtaining a resolution that established October as Disability History and Awareness Month
- Developed a strong self-advocacy training network
- VAULT a newly formed cross-disability selfadvocacy organization

Virginia's Goals for Self-Advocacy

- Have a strong voice in the state capitol
- Increase community living opinions
- Have competitive employment to be the first option
- Develop the next generation of self-advocate leaders
- Broaden the youth movement to make certain every student has an active part in the plans that are made for their future
- Connect more people with disabilities to a selfadvocacy group in their local area
- Support VAULT in their development of common agendas and policy statements
