Longitudinal Outcomes of Project SEARCH[™] in Upstate New York

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Abstract

Project SEARCH[™] is a successful job readiness program for high school students with disabilities, ages 18-21, and is recognized for its innovative approach and collaborative efforts between business, education and vocational rehabilitative services. Project SEARCH[™] employment outcomes far exceed the national average rate of employment for people with disabilities, with a 68% success rate in transitioning students from high school into competitive employment. However, little is known about the long term employment outcomes for the young people who have completed the training program. This study, that includes longitudinal data collected from three Project SEARCH[™] sites in Upstate New York that have an impressive 83% success rate overall, provides the first longitudinal analysis of the impact of Project SEARCH[™]. Data collected as part of this 5-year evaluation project indicate promising trends; and support the notion that the Project SEARCH[™] model is successfully preparing young students with disabilities with the skills necessary to both obtain and retain employment in integrated work settings. While these findings are promising, further research is needed to substantiate the reported outcomes.

Sample

124 students with IDD* who participated in one of three Project SEARCH[™] high school transition programs in Monroe County, NY between 2009 and 2014.

Method


- Demographic data was collected each September, at the start
 of the program year
- Employment outcomes data was submitted by the partner Supported Employment provider for each site upon program completion each June, and at 6-month intervals for up to 48 months post-exit
- All participant data was de-identified and entered into a Microsoft Excel database for descriptive analysis

Summary of Findings

- The average completion rate across all cohorts was 86%
- Almost half (48% of completers) were employed upon completion of program (baseline)
- At hire, graduates work an average of 23 hours/week at \$8.65/hour (NY minimum Wage: \$8/hour)




• The overall rate of employment across all four cohorts was 83%



 There was a steady increase in both hours worked per week and average wage/hour over time


Figures 2 and 3: Average wage and hours worked, reported over time



Summary of Findings, cont.

 While job retention diminished over time, Project SEARCH™ graduates maintained employment at a higher rate than reported as typical for people with IDD in NYS


