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Introduction

This resource guide was developed for the Community Connections Supporting Reentry trainings, which are a partnership between Iowa's Department of Corrections and Department of Human Services. The trainings are one part of the work being done to reduce recidivism statewide through the Department of Correction's Statewide Recidivism Reduction Initiative (SRR). The goal of these trainings is to develop strong connections among the community, prisons and community-based corrections, the community mental health and disability services system, and the substance-use disorder service systems for individuals reentering the community after incarceration. We hope these connections will lead to a greater understanding of the resources available to individuals to help them establish successful and permanent lives in the community, to reduce recidivism, and to increase public safety.

Training Objectives:

- 1. Develop an understanding of the challenges faced by individuals and their families as they reenter the community after incarceration.
- 2. Learn how the corrections and community service systems operate, including information about services and supports available and how they interact to support persons reentering the community.
- 3. Establish connections between the corrections and community services systems, including individual and agency contacts.


Resource Guide

Overlap of DOC Prisons and Community lowa Judicial Districts and Institutions MHRS Gegions




Department of Corrections


The Iowa Department of Corrections is responsible for the prisons that house approximately 8,300 individuals, and the eight Community Based Corrections (CBC) Districts that supervise approximately 30,300 individuals.

Vision: An Iowa with no more victims.

Mission: To advance successful offender reentry to protect the public, employees, and offenders from victimization.

Values and Beliefs: People can change; every person should be treated with dignity and respect; our efforts must make people safer; we must work as a team if we are to succeed.





Overview of Institutional Processes

The "corrections continuum" specifies five levels of criminal sanction from least to most restrictive. Individuals who receive the highest levels of sanctions are sentenced to institutions because of the type of crime committed, or it has been determined that they cannot be effectively managed in the community.

Corrections Continuum

Probation and Parole - Regular Supervision (Community Based Corrections)

• This type of supervision includes individuals on probation, parole, pretrial release, and others. Supervision, monitoring, and treatment are provided in the community and utilize locally available resources.

Probation and Parole - Intensive Supervision (Community Based Corrections)

- This program was created to provide more frequent, higher levels of supervision for individuals
 who have a higher risk for reoffending. The program often involves home visits, curfew and/or
 electronic monitoring, participation in group therapy, and other supports.
- Can include electronic monitoring, day programming, live-out programs, sex offender supervision, and special needs supervision.

Quasi-Incarceration - Residential Facilities (Community Based Corrections)

- These are sanctions supported by residential facility placement or 24-hour electronic monitoring and can include:
 - Residential treatment facilities
 - OWI treatment facilities
 - Work release facilities
 - House arrest with electronic monitoring

Quasi-Incarceration - Short Term Incarceration (*Prisons Corrections*)

- Jail for less than 30 days
- Violators' facilities
- Prison with sentence reconsideration

Incarceration (Prisons Corrections)

- Prison
- Jail for 30 days or longer

Prisons Corrections

Reception and Classification

The Iowa Medical and Classification Center in Coralville is the reception center for all males over the age of 18 in Iowa. The Iowa Correctional Institution for Women is the reception center for all females in Iowa. The reception process involves an orientation; medical, dental, and mental health screenings; and an in-depth intake that gathers information about an individual's background and experiences. This process takes between four and six weeks. The information gathered during reception helps determine needs and appropriate institutional placement.

Considerations during the initial classification determination include the individual's criminal history and present charge, current behavior, health (including mental health), potential for violence, and other factors.

Classifications are reviewed periodically; not less than once every twelve months. Some of the many factors considered during classification reviews include current and past criminal behavior; adjustment to the institutional setting which includes behavior, escapes, and other rule violations; age; and amount of time served versus time remaining to be served.

Custody Levels and Definitions

All individuals are classified within one of five custody classifications: maximum custody, medium custody, minimum custody, minimum work out, and minimum live out.

- **Maximum custody:** This is the most restrictive level, generally for individuals who have been convicted of violent crimes or exhibit behavioral challenges while incarcerated. Individuals in maximum custody are highly supervised and generally reside in single cells within a building or unit.
- Medium custody: Individuals are usually assigned to a dormitory or cell setting and generally
 restricted to working within the boundaries of the institution. Individuals assigned to this custody level
 present potential risk for escape and/or require a more structured environment.
- **Minimum custody:** Individuals assigned to this custody level are considered to be a minimal escape risk and demonstrate stable behavior.
- Minimum work out: Individuals assigned to this custody level may work outside the secure perimeter
 of the facility, have off grounds work assignments, or participate in furloughs.
- **Minimum live out:** Individuals assigned to this custody level are determined to be sufficiently stable to live in an open, non-secured setting.

Re-Entry Planning

Planning for reentry begins when an individual enters the system with the assessment process to make sure they are connected to the types of services, treatment, and programming that will reduce their likelihood of reoffending and increase their chances of success once they reenter the community. Such programming is meant to assist in planning how to find employment, housing, transportation, continuing in addiction recovery, furthering education, and seeking available resources in the community.

Pre-release programming includes education on community supervision requirements, employment planning, vocational placement resources, social security benefits, banking and financial management, public assistance sources, community substance use disorder and mental health resources, heath care issues, and family reintegration.

Before release to community-based supervision, individuals in prison and work release must have a suitable place to live upon returning to the community. A Home Placement Questionnaire (HPQ) is used to verify that a residence requested by an individual meets the requirements set forth by the Department of Corrections to minimize the risk of reoffending. An example of the HPQ can be found in the appendix at the back of this guide.


Behavioral Health Medication Voucher Program

Individuals released from prison may access up to 90-days of behavioral health medications at no cost. At the time of release, the individual is provided a 30-day supply of all medications, and an additional 60-days of behavioral health prescriptions are transferred to a participating community pharmacy and filled at no cost to him/her.

Any individual released from one of Iowa's nine DOC facilities with an individual or household income 200% of the federal poverty level or below that is uninsured or underinsured may use a DOC Behavioral Health Medication Voucher. Eligibility will be conducted by DOC staff at the time of release.

This program launched in April 2013, and preliminary data showed program participants had lower recidivism rates than a comparison group not participating.

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Community-Based Corrections

Community-Based Corrections (CBC) provides a range of sanctions that are a less restrictive alternative to prison that involves various levels of supervision within the community.

CBC services in Iowa are operated by eight judicial districts that together cover all 99 counties. Each district operates as a separate agency under the direction of a Board of Directors and administered by a Director. The majority of individuals under state correctional supervision are supervised in the community.

CBC services are separated into two categories: field services and residential facility services.

Supervision Levels/Risk Assessment

All individuals assigned to supervision by field services or in a residential facility are assessed to determine level of risk and level of supervision needed. Assessments also help determine case planning and the need for referrals to treatment or other support services. The higher the supervision/risk levels, the more closely an individual will be monitored and supported by community based corrections staff.

Individuals convicted of sex offenses receive intensive supervision and participate in programming designed to help reduce sexual abuse victimization. Iowa law requires individuals convicted of a sex offense against a minor be electronically monitored for the first five years they are under correctional supervision.

Field Service Supervision

The majority of individuals supervised in the community are on field service supervision. Field offices are located in local communities within each CBC District that provide staff for a variety of probation and parole programs and supervision levels.

- Probation Supervision: An individual is placed on probation after being convicted of a crime, and having their
 jail or prison sentence suspended. This means they can be under correctional supervision in the community as
 an alternative to going to jail or prison. Probation Officers monitor compliance and use existing local resources
 to address specific challenges related to rehabilitation. Supervision emphasizes employment stability, victim
 restitution, community service sentencing, community resources, one-on-one counseling, and monitoring the
 individual in the community.
- **Parole Supervision:** Parole is granted to individuals by the lowa Board of Parole, either directly out of a state institution or from a work release facility. Individuals on parole are supervised by parole officers in the community. Monitoring and treatment are provided in the community and utilize locally available resources.
- Low-Risk Probation: This program is for individuals who are determined to be low risk and require minimal supervision by the courts. The court outlines specific requirements the individual must fulfill in a designated time period. Probation officers supervise individuals and the progress they are making, and report back to the court.
- Intensive Supervision Program: This program was created to provide more frequent, higher levels of supervision for individuals who have a higher risk for reoffending. The program often involves home visits, curfew and/or electronic monitoring, participation in group therapy, and other supports.
- Pre-Trial Release: This serves as an alternative to the traditional bail bond system. Under pretrial release an
 individual is released from jail pending trial under the supervision of a Judicial District. The district monitors the
 individual and ensures they appear in court when directed.
- Presentence Investigation (PSI): This report includes a both an individual's social history and as well as their criminal history. The investigation is completed on order of the Court, and is used by the Judge in sentencing proceedings, as well as the Probation and Parole Officer, DOC institutions, and the Board of Parole to assist in developing treatment plans and in decision-making.
- **Drug Court:** This program targets individuals who are at high-risk by combining accountability, treatment, and rehabilitation under the authority of the court. Drug courts address substance abuse treatment needs, and provide referral and/or treatment for co-occurring disorders. Drug courts are a community based alternative to incarceration for high-risk drug offenses, and generally if an individual fails to complete the program they will go to prison.
- **Community Service Sentencing:** This type of sentencing requires individuals to perform a specific number of community service hours as an alternative to incarceration or a fine.

- Sex Offender Treatment Program (SOTP): This program provides treatment through group counseling and education, combined with intensive supervision and electronic monitoring of individuals convicted of sex crimes.
- **Electronic Monitoring:** This system uses a specially equipped bracelet to monitor the location of an individual. There are several systems used across the state, including voice verification, radio frequency, video display, GPS, and alcohol sensor. Electronic monitoring is most typically used for individuals convicted of sex offenses. A command center for the bracelet technology is operated by the Fifth Judicial District.
- Treatment Alternatives for Safer Communities (TASC) Program: This program provides coordination between the criminal justice system and the substance use disorder treatment system. This program currently operates only in the Sixth Judicial District as part of its ANCHOR Center.
- **Domestic Abuse Program:** This program combines group counseling and education for men and women who have been convicted of domestic violence offenses. Iowa Code requires that individuals convicted of domestic violence attend treatment education. The Department of Corrections, Judicial Districts, and the University of Iowa worked together to create a curriculum for a program called Achieving Change Through Value-Based Behavior (ACT-V), which has been implemented in each district as of 2014.
- **Moving On:** This is a treatment program for women in the corrections system that helps participants learn to identify personal and community resources, and find alternatives to criminal activity. This program also serves as the treatment option for women who have been court ordered to a treatment and education program following a domestic violence charge.
- Youthful Offender Program: This program targets youth ages 16-21 who are in the adult system, either on pretrial release, or adjudicated as adults. The program connects participants to substance use disorder treatment services in the community and teaches life skills. Current this program only operates in the Fifth CBC District.

Residential Correctional Facilities

Overview: Individuals may be placed in residential facilities by the court (probation, pretrial release, or the OWI program), the Parole Board upon release from a corrections institution (parole or work release), or the corrections continuum. Residential facilities provide a structured environment for high-risk/need individuals that include employment, financial management for court-ordered responsibilities, community service work, and participation in educational and treatment programming. While living in a residential facility, individuals must pay rent, which is determined by each district, and are responsible for any other court ordered financial obligations like victim restitution or child support. Privileges are granted for complying with program rules and requirements.

Some districts also have day reporting programs, where an individual is allowed to live at home while abiding by the supervising residential facilities rules. Noncompliance may result in being ordered back to the residential facility.

Residential programming includes:

- The OWI Program for individuals convicted of at least their second OWI offense. Individuals are sentenced to the Department of Corrections (DOC) and housed at a residential facility for substance use disorder treatment. Treatment providers for this prison-diversion program are licensed by the lowa Department of Public Health.
- Job readiness training
- Individual and group counseling
- Anger management and cognitive thinking
- Referrals for substance abuse and/or mental health treatment
- Sex offender treatment, domestic violence education programs, and services for special needs populations

Pre-Release Medicaid Enrollment Program

Individuals preparing for release from all correctional facilities in Iowa are able to apply for Medicaid benefits before release, with the goal of leaving the institution with a Medicaid card in hand, or having one waiting at their community residence.

This streamlined application process was piloted by a DOC/DHS workgroup in April 2014 in a few correctional facilities, and expanded statewide in 2015. The goal of this initiative is to connect individuals to needed health care, mental health services, and substance use disorder services upon release to assist with reducing the recidivism.

Corrections staff assist individuals in completing application materials, and submitting them to Iowa Medicaid Enterprise (IME). Staff are also able to assist with filling out medically exempt forms, which is a program that provides enhanced mental health and substance use disorder coverage for those with qualifying diagnoses.

Iowa Workforce Development Offender Reentry Program

The Offender Reentry Program is a partnership between IWD and DOC that places workforce advisors onsite at facilities in Mitchellville, Newton, and Rockwell City. Advisors work with individuals on job readiness skills, resources, and preparing for employment upon release, with the goal of having program participants placed in jobs before release. Participants have the opportunity to test for the National Career Readiness Certificate, which measures skills in math, reading for information, and locating information. This is an opportunity for individuals to add a credential to their résumé. Advisors also work with employers to address barriers they may have to hiring individuals with criminal records.

Iowa DOC Apprentice Program

The Apprenticeship Program is offered in all nine correctional facilities in Iowa through the US Department of Labor Office of Apprentice ship to assists individuals in completing career and educational programs to prepare them for high skill, high wage, and high demand jobs after incarceration. The program combines self-study and on the job training to individuals with at least a high school diploma. Upon completion individuals receive a certification from the US DOL. Medical Assistance

Iowa Medicaid Enterprise, which is a branch of the Department of Human Services, oversees Medicaid in Iowa.

Medicaid Benefits and Inmate Status

Medicaid is not available to individuals considered to be inmates of public, non-medical institutions. Jails and prisons are considered public institutions, and individuals are not eligible for Medicaid while incarcerated.

- A person who is on **probation or parole** is not considered to be an inmate of a public institution, and can be eligible for Medicaid if they meet all other eligibility requirements.
- A person who is on work-release is considered to be an inmate of a public institution, and is not eligible for Medicaid.

Medicaid Overview

To be eligible to receive Medicaid services in Iowa a person must be a resident of the state and a U.S. citizen; and either qualify because of income or meet the Social Security Administration's standards for disability; and sometimes meet additional eligibility requirements. It is helpful to understand that there are two Medicaid programs for adults between the ages of 19 and 64 in Iowa: those who qualify for "traditional" or "state plan" Medicaid and those who qualify for the "Iowa Health and Wellness Plan" or "Medicaid expansion." Both groups are part of the Iowa Health Link managed care program, but program requirements and the benefits they are eligible for can vary a little.

- Traditional or State Plan Medicaid: This coverage group is for people are in a mandatory coverage group. It includes individuals with disabilities, and individuals who qualify because of their income and are a child, a parent living with a child under the age of 18 who receives Medicaid, a woman who is pregnant, or a person over the age of 65.
- **Iowa Health and Wellness Plan:** The Iowa Health and Wellness Plan began in 2014 after the Affordable Care Act gave states the option of expanding Medicaid coverage to adults without dependent children between the ages of 19 and 64 who are at or below 133% of the Federal Poverty Level. Beginning on July 1, 2017 Iowa Health and Wellness members are eligible to receive full dental coverage in their first year, and in order to keep coverage in subsequent years must complete certain "Healthy Behaviors" which include an oral self-assessment and a preventative dental visit.

Iowa Medicaid has three main coverage groups:

- **Iowa Health Link:** The majority of people who receive Medicaid in Iowa are enrolled in the Iowa Health Link managed care program. This includes people who are on "traditional" or "state plan" Medicaid and people who are eligible for Medicaid through Medicaid expansion.
- **Healthy and Well Kids in Iowa** (*hawk-i*): This is Iowa's Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) for children whose families meet certain income requirements. Children enrolled in *hawk-i* receive their services from one of the three managed care companies.
- Medicaid Fee-for-Service (FFS): Though most people who are on Medicaid in Iowa receive their services through a managed care organization, a small number of people receive their benefits from the Medicaid Fee-for-Service program that is administered by the Department of Human Services. This program includes people who are served by or qualify for the following programs: Health Insurance Premium Program; Medicare Savings Program; Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiary; Three Day Emergency; Medically Needy; Presumptive Eligibility; American Indian or Alaska Native program; Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly; and the Family Planning Program.

Iowa Health Link

In April 2016 Iowa transitioned the majority of its Medicaid members to a managed care system. Members are able to choose between three Managed Care Organizations (MCOs), Amerigroup, AmeriHealth Caritas, and UnitedHealthcare. MCOs have to cover the same benefits Iowa Medicaid Enterprise covered.

When an individual enrolls in Medicaid they are automatically assigned to one of the three MCOs. This is done randomly but also is set up to keep families assigned to the same MCO. A person has 90 days from the date their coverage begins to switch MCOs. Individuals may also change throughout the year for "good cause" and during the 60 day annual enrollment period. Things to consider when choosing an MCO is whether existing providers are part of their network, and by comparing the value-added services offered by each MCO. DHS has resources for helping individuals select an MCO that best fits their needs on their website.

Child Support Recovery

The Child Support Recovery Unit (CSRU) is part of the Department of Human Services and is responsible for assisting families achieve and maintain economic self-sufficiency by establishing and enforcing child and medical support orders and processing support payments. They do this by:

- Locating parents and their employers or other income sources
- Establishing paternity
- Establishing support orders
- Suspending and reinstating support orders
- Modifying support orders
- Registering other states' orders for enforcement or modification in Iowa
- Sending and receiving referrals for services to and from other states
- Enforcing health insurance orders
- Receiving and disbursing child support and medical support payments
- Answering customers' questions and concerns

Enforcing support orders can be done through income withholding, offsets of federal and state tax refunds, offsets of payments owed to federal and state vendors who do business with government agencies, administrative levies of accounts at financial institutions, license sanctions, reporting to credit agencies, and initiating contempt of court and wage garnishment actions.

Individuals Served

CSRU serves people who:

- Are receiving public assistance such as Family Investment Program (FIP) benefits, foster care services, and in some situations, Medicaid benefits.
- Received public assistance in the past. Unless the payee notifies CSRU not to, they continue to collect support for the children when a family stops getting public assistance.
- Apply for child support services. To apply for services, visit <u>www.childsupport.ia.gov</u>. Print off the application form, complete it, and return it with a \$25 application fee.
- Live in other states but need services from us because the other parent lives or works here.

Iowa Workforce Development (IWD)

Iowa Works One-Stop Centers

IWD operates 16 regional one-stop centers that provide information and workforce development services to job seekers, businesses, employees, students, schools, and the general public.

Services to job seekers include:

- Career counseling
- Job search skills development
- Locating employment opportunities
- Academic skill testing
- Hands-on computer classes
- High School Equivalency Certificate (HiSET) preparation
- College research

- Creating resumes and cover letters
- Preparing for interviews
- 6 Ste.ps to a Successful Career Transition
- Assistance with managing Unemployment Insurance claims
- Job fairs and other special events
- Skill upgrades and training
- Career and skill assessments

Workshop for Individuals with a Criminal History: The majority of the offices across the state also offer a workshop that prepares individuals who have criminal histories for employment. The workshop is designed to help address how to make the right first impression and includes verbal and non-verbal communication, and strategies for answering questions about their criminal history in an interview and cover letter, and how to properly indicate information about criminal charges on job applications. Attendees receive information on how to add their work history while incarcerated on their resume to avoid gaps in employment. Participants learn about tax incentives/credits and strategies for identifying skills they gained while incarcerated.

Resources for Businesses/Employers

Federal Bonding Incentives: Employers who hire formerly incarcerated individuals may be eligible for the Federal Bonding Program, which benefits the employer by offering bond coverage provided at no cost. The bond coverage is in effect the day the new employee begins working and continues for a six-month period. The employer profits from the worker's skills and abilities without taking the risk of potential theft or dishonesty. There are no documents to sign or paperwork to complete. The bond is available at no cost to employers and is offered in \$5,000 increments up to a maximum of \$25,000. The purpose is to protect the employer against crimes of mistrust and covers the employer for loss due to employee theft. It could be theft of items, money, misuse of customer credit card, etc, and is valid for the specified six-month period issued. Employers can also request to extend the six months to a year by asking for another bond when the six months is up.

Work Opportunity Tax Credit (WOTC): Both the federal and state governments offer tax credits for hiring exfelons. The Work Opportunity Tax Credit (WOTC) offers a federal tax credit up to \$2,400.00 for each new hire. In addition, the state of lowa offers a state tax credit 65% of the wages paid to an ex-felon in the first 12 months of employment. The maximum deduction is \$20,000.00 per employee. Iowa WORKS staff profiles an employer to understand their specific hiring needs, which then helps them determine the knowledge, skills, abilities and aptitude to look for when matching an employee successfully with a job seeker.



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Veterans Services

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is composed of three branches: Veterans Health Administration (VHA), Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA), and the National Cemetery Administration (NCA).

County Veterans Offices

Each of Iowa's 99 counties has a County Commission on Veterans Affairs, also called County Veterans Offices. The VA recommends that veterans visit their county office as their first point of contact when seeking assistance. County staff can help individuals apply for health benefits, compensation and pension programs; obtain military records; connect with VA health services and other local social service programs; and provide further assistance understanding and navigating the various state and federal resources available to veterans. Some county offices have funds for providing emergency assistance for qualifying veterans for things like food, rent, utilities, and other needs. Contact the county office for more information.

Healthcare Services

Veteran health care services are organized and administered at multiple regional levels in order to provide integrated, coordinated care close to where veterans live. There are four VA Healthcare Systems that include services areas in Iowa. Each is headquartered at a Veterans Administration Medical Center (VAMC) and includes several Community Based Outpatient Clinics (CBOCs) that provide various outpatient health care and mental health care services.

Services for Justice Involved Veterans

Veterans Justice Outreach (VJO): Provides outreach to Veterans in contact with the justice system through encounters with police, jails, and courts. The goal of the program is to provide timely access to VA services for eligible Veterans to prevent homelessness and avoid the unnecessary incarceration because of mental health and other clinical issues among Veterans. Each VA medical center has a VJO Specialist who serves as a liaison between VA and the local criminal justice system.

VJO Specialists services include:

- Direct outreach, assessment, and case management for justice-involved veterans in local courts and jails
- Assisting with eligibility determination, enrollment, and referral to both VA and non-VA services upon release
- Providing training to local law enforcement on veterans' issues and offer strategies to help work with veterans

- Providing information and education to courts and attorneys about veterans' issues and services available
- Collaborating with judges and specialty courts to connect veterans to VA treatment services and homeless programs

Health Care for Reentry Veterans (HCRV): This program is designed to promote success and prevent homelessness among Veterans returning home after incarceration, and major component of the program is providing information to veterans while they are incarcerated so they can begin preparing for reentry as soon as possible. Services include outreach and pre-release assessment services for veterans in prison; referrals and linkages to medical, mental health, and social services on release; employment support; and short-term case management assistance upon release.

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Housing Resources

Reentry Specific Issues/Resources

MYTH: Individuals who have been convicted of a crime are "banned" from public housing.

FACT: Public Housing Authorities have great discretion in determining their admissions and occupancy policies for individuals with criminal records. While Public Housing Authorities can choose to ban individuals with certain offenses from participating in public housing and Section 8 programs, it is not HUD policy to do so. In fact, in many circumstances, formerly incarcerated people should not be denied access.

There are only two convictions that automatically exclude an individual from being eligible for public housing assistance:

- A member of the household is subject to a lifetime registration requirement under a state sex offender registry program
- A member of the household has ever been convicted of drug-related criminal activity for manufacturing or producing methamphetamine on the premises of federally assisted housing

Public Housing Authorities

Public Housing Authorities administer and oversee federal housing assistance programs that can support individuals who qualify by subsidizing portions of their rent. In Iowa these housing assistance programs are organized by city, county, or regionally. A list organized by county can be found on page 44.

- Housing Choice Voucher (HCV)/Section 8: The Housing Choice Voucher, also known as Section 8, is a
 tenant-based assistance program, which means the funding is tied to the individual, not the specific rental
 property. Since housing assistance is provided on behalf of the family or individual, participants are able to
 find their own housing, including single-family homes, townhouses and apartments. The participant is free
 to choose any housing that meets the requirements of the program and is not limited to units located in
 subsidized housing projects.
- Public Housing: Public housing provides decent and safe rental housing for eligible low-income families, the elderly, and persons with disabilities. Public housing comes in all sizes and types, from scattered single family houses to high-rise apartments for elderly families. Public housing is limited to low-income families and individuals. A housing authority determines eligibility based on: 1) annual gross income; 2) whether the applicant qualifies as elderly, a person with a disability, or as a family; and 3) U.S. citizenship or eligible immigration status.

Services to Help Find and Maintain Housing

lowa Housing Search (www.iowahousingsearch.org): lowa Housing Search is a free online resource that allows individuals to search available rental properties in lowa that fit their specific needs and budget. Results can be filtered based on cost, amenities, number of bedrooms, proximity to public transportation, whether the landlord requires a criminal background check, rental assistance accepted, accessibility features, and more. Individuals seeking housing and service providers can call a toll-free, multilingual call center for assistance with housing searches at (877)428-8844. Information can be provided by phone, email, mail, and fax. The site also features a service provider portal, which allows approved agencies to search for listings that serve individuals experiencing certain barriers to finding housing. Providers can design and save search criteria so notifications are sent to them when an available listing matches their saved criteria. Information on how to set up an agency account can be found on the website.

County General Assistance: lowa law requires counties to administer general assistance funds to individuals in extreme financial need for expenses such as rent, utilities, and burial costs. Eligible expenses and program requirements vary by county. Individuals are typically only eligible to receive

funds a certain number of times in a twelve-month period. County boards of supervisors establish the rules and eligible expenses. Visit the county website for information specific to the county in which the individual seeking assistance resides for more information on eligibility and how to apply.

Community Action Agencies: Community Action Agencies provide case management and other supportive services to help individuals and families experiencing poverty meet their basic needs and develop long-term economic security and self-sufficiency. Services cover a wide array of need areas that address issues caused by poverty and barriers to ending the cycle of poverty for individuals, families, and communities. Community Action Agencies are located across the state and provide services in all 99 counties. Specific programs and services vary, but most often include housing assistance, home energy efficiency and weatherization, financial planning and counseling, food assistance, health and behavioral health services, and early childhood education.

HUD Approved Housing Counseling Agencies: The Housing Counseling Assistance Program provides services to individuals, families, or groups who are tenants, homeowners, homeless, or homebuyers. Services are available to anyone, including those who receive any type of rental service whether through HUD; Veterans Affairs; or any other local, state, or federal program. Counseling services focus on a wide array of topics focused on helping people meet their housing goals, including financial analysis and budget planning; fair housing, landlord/tenant, and fair lending laws and requirements; information on rental assistance programs and other services; and understanding lease terms and rent delinquency. Services are available through HUD approved agencies throughout the state.

Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) Rent Subsidy Program: The lowa Finance Authority administers the HCBS Rent Subsidy Program to assist eligible applicants who receive services under a federal Medicaid home and community based services waiver or the Money Follows the Person program. The program provides temporary monthly rental assistance to individuals while they are waiting to be eligible for a local, state, or federal rental assistance program like Section 8. The program maintains a waitlist and accepts applications on an on-going basis.

Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA): This federal program assists individuals who have been diagnosed with HIV/AIDS and their families who are homeless or at risk of homelessness. HOPWA is a need based program, which means there are several eligibility requirements and individuals must demonstrate need in addition to their diagnosis. Currently the Iowa Finance Authority allocates funding to five project sponsors around the state that cover all 99 counties between them. Housing Resources for Veterans:

• U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development-VA Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH): This program provides rental assistance vouchers to Veterans who are eligible for VA health care services; have a serious mental illness, history of substance use disorder, and/or physical disability, and are experiencing or at risk of homelessness. This supportive housing program is a partnership between HUD and the Veterans Administration that is focused on helping veterans and their families experiencing or at risk of homelessness. The program provides participants with a HUD Housing Choice Voucher (also called Section 8) and case management focused on recovery and connecting veterans with supportive services like health care, mental health care, and substance use disorder treatment services to help them effectively function in the community and maintain permanent housing. Individuals who are required to

maintain Lifetime Sexual Offender Registry status are not eligible to participate in the program. www.va.gov/homeless/hud-vash.asp

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Mental Health and Disability Services Regions

Mental health and disability services (MHDS) regions provide an array of services to individuals who are not eligible for Medicaid but have needs related to mental health or disability status, and individuals who are enrolled in Medicaid but need access to mental health or disability services not covered by Medicaid. All regions must provide a set of "core services" to individuals with a mental illness and/or an intellectual disability at or below 150% of federal poverty level (FPL). Many regions provide services to individuals with a developmental disability or brain injury, and individuals who earn between 150-200% of FPL. All regions fund services beyond the required core services.

There are currently 14 approved MHDS Regions operating in Iowa. Regions are made up of three or more counties, with the exception of Polk County, which operates as a one county region.

Individuals to Connect

- Those who are not Medicaid eligible but have needs related to their mental health or disability diagnosis
- Those who are enrolled in Medicaid but need access to services not covered by Medicaid

Eligibility

Funding available to support individuals beyond the required "core population" (mental illness and intellectual disability) varies by region. Income guidelines and other eligibility criteria vary as well. Contacting a regional office directly is the best way to get more information on eligibility.

How to Contact/Refer for Services

- Regional Offices: Most regions have multiple offices located within the region where individuals seeking funding for mental health and/or disability services can fill out an application for services. Local regional offices are a good resource for anyone who has questions about services, eligibility, or the application process.
- Access Points: Regions are required to have additional access points around the region. These are usually housed within community service organizations, hospitals, or other places where individuals access mental health and/or disability services. Applications are available at designated access points, and staff have been trained to assist with the application process and forward completed applications to the region.

Core Services

Core services are the services and supports regions are required to provide to eligible individuals.

- Treatment services, such as:
 - Assessment and evaluation
 - Mental health outpatient therapy
 - Medication prescribing and management
 - Mental health inpatient treatment
- Basic crisis response, such
 - 24-hour access to crisis response
 - Evaluation
 - Personal emergency response system

- Support for community living, Recovery services, such as: such as:
 - Home health aide
 - o Home and vehicle modification
 - Respite
 - Supportive community
- Family support
 - Peer support
- Employment support, such as:
 - Day habilitation
- Service coordination, including coordinating physical health and Supported employment
 Prevocational services

 Transported primary care, such as:

 Case management
 Health

Other Services: Regions provide additional services, including comprehensive crisis and jail diversion services. Contact the Region to determine additional services available.



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Integrated Health Homes

An integrated health home (IHH) is a team of professionals who work together to provide comprehensive, person-centered care coordination to adults with a serious mental illness and children with a serious emotional disturbance. In addition to coordinating physical, behavioral, and mental health services, IHH teams work with individuals to improve overall wellness, and connection to the community. This service is free for those who qualify.

The goal of the IHH program is to remove the silos that often exist across different systems of care, and coordinate an individual's mental and physical health care, and all of the other factors that contribute to recovery and stability at home and in the community. IHHs operate across the state, some serving only adults, only children, or both. While there is at least one IHH designated to serve every county, eligible individuals may choose to enroll with any IHH.

Care teams include nurses, care coordinators, and peer/family support specialists.

 include schizophrenia, schizoaffective disorder, bipolar disorder, major depression, or any other
 significant mental health diagnosis that causes impairments to daily functioning.
- Children who are enrolled in Medicaid and have a diagnosis of a serious emotional disturbance.

Community Mental Health Centers (CMHC) operate across the state to provide a specified set of services to meet the mental health needs of individuals in the state. Not all services are available at all CMHC locations. In counties where a CMHC is not available, a Mental Health Service Provider (MHSP) is available to provide community mental health services. A list of Community Mental Health Centers and Mental Health Service providers organized by county begins on page 72.

Services Provided

- Outpatient services, such as psychiatric evaluations, medication management, and individual, family, and group therapy
- 24-hour emergency services, such as evaluation and stabilization, medication evaluation, and referral to hospitalization
- Day treatment, or psychosocial rehabilitation services
- Community support services
- Education services to individuals, groups, and the greater community

Who to Connect

- Individuals who are experiencing a mental health crisis
- Individuals who have a mental illness or serious mental illness.
- Individuals with co-occurring disorders (mental illness co-occurring with substance use disorder, intellectual disability, developmental disability, brain injury, autism, etc.)



Substance Use Disorder Treatment Services

The Iowa Department of Public Health (IDPH) Division of Behavioral Health oversees substance use disorder and problem gambling treatment, intervention, education, and prevention programs in Iowa. IDPH is responsible for regulating and licensing more than 120 different substance use disorder evaluation and treatment programs. Of those, 23 of are part of the IDPH-funded treatment network that covers all 99 counties.

Iowa Department of Public Health Funded Programs

Individuals who are low income, do not have health insurance, and/or have minimal benefit coverage can receive funding through the lowa Department of Public Health for assessment and treatment by going directly to an IDPH-funded provider. The provider will review income and family size to determine eligibility for funding and any co-pay that may be required using a sliding fee scale. IDPH uses a combination of state and federal funds and has ensured funded providers are geographically distributed across the state. Individuals may seek services from any IDPH-funded program in the state, regardless of where they live.

All 23 programs assure outpatient substance use disorder treatment services are available to residents of all 99 lowa counties. Generally, IDPH-funded agencies also contract with IDPH to provide substance abuse education and prevention, specialized treatment, wraparound and gap-filling support services, and problem gambling prevention and treatment.

Specialized treatment and recovery support services are provided through:

- Access to Recovery (ATR) SAMHSA grant that funds recovery support services such as transportation, childcare, peer coaching, and care coordination to substance use disorder clients and National Guard members.
- Families in Focus SAMHSA grant (also known as the State Youth Treatment Implementation) for provider training and evidence-based substance use disorder and mental health treatment to adolescents and families.
- Medication Assisted Treatment Prescription Drug and Opioid Addiction (MAT-PDOA) SAMHSA grant that funds the enhancement and expansion of Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) in Iowa.
- Opioid State Targeted Response— SAMHSA grant that expands access to Medication Assisted Treatment and recovery supports for people with opioid use disorders. Services being coordinated through each of the above noted 23 treatment providers.
- **Opioid Treatment Project** IDPH funds selected opioid treatment programs to provide medication assisted treatment to lowans in the form of methadone maintenance.
- **Pregnant Women and Women with Dependent Children** -Specialized treatment programs and programming for pregnant and parenting women, funded by the Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant Women's Set Aside funding.
- Your Life lowa- provides information, resources, support, and referrals to treatment for gambling, substance use and abuse, and suicide. Your Life lowa offers these services via telephone, texting, online chat, and on the Your Life lowa website.



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Public Transportation

Public transportation in Iowa is served by 12 large urban, seven small urban, 16 regional, and four intercity transportation bus services. Public transit systems vary on how they are organized and how they operate, but one common element is that their services must be open to the public. Costs vary across systems based on services provided and other factors and can be found online or by calling your local providers. Contact information for each transit system begins on page 85.

Transit Systems

Urban Transit Systems: Iowa has 19 urban public transit systems that each must serve at least one community with 20,000 or more population. Urban public transit systems generally operate buses along fixed routes designed to serve a majority of neighborhoods and major activity centers, like large employers, government offices, medical clinics, grocery stores, senior centers, shopping malls, etc. All fixed-route buses in lowa are accessible to persons with disabilities, and urban systems are also required to provide ADA paratransit services for persons with disabilities who may not be able to physically ride or navigate the fixed route system. ADA paratransit services typically operate on a reservation basis, with ride requests made the day before the planned trip. Paratransit services are specifically designed to serve persons qualifying under the ADA eligibility guidelines, plus their aides or companions, but a few offer the service to the elderly and/or the general public as well. Individual public transit systems should be contacted for their specific qualification requirements.

Rural Transit Systems: lowa has 16 public transit regions that cover all of the state's ninety-nine counties. Most public transit services by lowa's regional public transit systems are provided on a demand-response, rather than a fixed route basis. This means that a passenger must call in to request each ride. Most also allow "standing reservations" or "subscriptions" that allow a person to request the same ride every weekday or on a certain day every week or every other week. All regional public transit services are required to be accessible to persons with disabilities. In many rural areas, depending on funding levels and demand, public transit services may only be available on certain days of the week, and certain connections may only be available a couple times per month.

Intercity Bus Program: A certain portion of the state's transportation funding must be used to support intercity bus services, and routes must include stops in non-urban locations. A map of current routes can be found at http://www.iowadot.gov/transit/pdf/icb.pdf.

Mobility Management

Mobility coordinators (sometimes called mobility managers) help individuals navigate to where they need to go, no matter the number of modes of transportation required. Referrals are made to public and private transportation providers alike. Mobility coordinators may offer travel training courses to help persons learn to ride the bus, and they know various funding sources that can help pay for transportation for eligible riders. Mobility coordinators are also available to speak to interested groups including human service agencies, businesses, and other organizations on transportation resources, options, and coordination opportunities in the area. The Statewide Mobility Manager acts as a contact for persons in areas not served by a regional or urban mobility coordinator, assisting with travel navigation and providing referrals to local transportation providers.

lowa has a new ride matching system that can help people find viable commute options such as carpool partners, vanpool routes, transit routes, and more. Once registered individuals can log their commute route and find options based on origin and destination to match with nearby commuters with similar schedules. There is also an option to search for one-time transportation needs. There is an option to indicate passenger only for individuals without a car or driver's license.

Local Planning, Coordination, and Resources

Passenger Transportation Plans: Iowa has nine Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO) and 18 Regional Planning Affiliations (RPA) that are made up of associations of local governments that work together to promote local and regional coordination related to transportation planning, economic development, operation of transit systems, zoning, human services, housing, and environmental concerns. One of their charges to create and update a Passenger Transportation Plan (PTP) focused on coordination between transit providers and health and human service agencies. The passenger transportation planning process must include input from human service agencies/ organizations, private transportation providers, and transit systems and consider all passenger transportation needs and services. Plans must be updated every five years at a minimum, and include opportunities for public input. MPOs and RPAs often use Transportation Advisory Groups as a primary source of input for their Passenger Transportation Plans.

Transportation Advisory Groups (TAGs) are made up of volunteers from the human services and transportation sectors, including representatives of transit or passenger transportation industries, human service agencies, the non-emergency medical transportation industry, the aging population, individuals with disabilities, low-income populations, and others. The primary purpose of a TAG is to provide a forum to discuss transportation issues and identify opportunities to create a more coordinated transportation system that is affordable and accessible to all individuals in the community. TAGs vary in size and function, some are formal decision-making bodies, while others act as less formal advisory groups.

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lowa Department on Aging

The lowa Department on Aging (IDA) strives to improve the quality of life and care of older lowans through advocacy, planning, policy development and the administration and support of statewide programs and services that promote health, safety and long-term independence. IDA's "aging network" is designed to serve all lowans who are 60 and older, with particular emphasis on populations demonstrating the greatest social or economic need.

Area Agencies on Aging

IDA has designated six Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs) that provide information and referrals to older adults, adults with disabilities, and veterans and their caregivers; and coordinate a wide range of long-term living and community support services, such as case management, congregate and home-delivered meals, employment services, family caregiver services, options counseling, respite care and transportation services.

Employment Services

- The Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP) assists low-income, unemployed
 individuals over the age of 55 who have limited employment prospects due to a lack of experience,
 outdated skills or long-term unemployment. IDA contracts with the AARP Foundation to place participants
 at government or non-profit organizations, where they receive paid training for community service work.
 The objective is to equip individuals with the job skills they need to obtain and maintain unsubsidized
 employment.
- The Older Worker Employment Program (OWEP) is a collaborative effort of IDA, the AAAs, and lowa Vocational Rehabilitation Services. The program uses federal funds to house older worker employment specialists at each of the state's six Area Agencies on Aging, where they provide employment services to lowans aged 55 or older with disabilities. Services include assisting job candidates with completing job applications, writing resumes, practicing for interviews and networking with prospective employers.

Health and Mental Health Services

- **Supportive Services:** With the help of access services (e.g., transportation, case management, information and assistance), in-home services (e.g., personal care, chore and homemaker assistance) and community services (e.g., mental health services, adult day care), individuals can prevent early institutionalization and instead continue living at home or in their community of choice. Area Agencies on Aging work at the local level to coordinate services and to provide information, referral and assistance, options counseling, case management, and the development of a person-centered plan of care.
- Mental Health: IDA collaborates with a variety of agencies and organizations to expand publics knowledge and understanding of mental health and the aging process; to design, test and promote the use of innovative ideas and best practices in mental health programs and services for older lowans; and to help provide mental health training to personnel within the field of aging. In addition, IDA works to address the unique needs of older lowans with Alzheimer's disease or other dementias, as those illnesses are most prevalent among individuals over age 65.
- Veteran-Directed Home and Community Based Services (VD-HCBS): This program is a partnership between IDA and the Veterans Health Administration to help veterans of any age who are enrolled in the Iowa City VA Medical Center and are potential candidates for nursing facility placement to receive care at home, in a caregiver's home, or in an independent living community. - Nutrition Program: Through the AAAs, this program provides congregate and home-delivered meals to
 individuals aged 60 or older, as well as nutrition education and counseling. Each AAA maintains a list of
 meal sites and providers within its Planning Service Area and can assist with enrolling an individual in the
 program.
- Falls Prevention: IDA works in collaboration with the Iowa Department of Public Health and the Iowa Falls Prevention Coalition to educate aging network professionals, at-risk individuals, family members, caregivers and the general public about the prevalence of falls in Iowa, their impact on quality of life and methods to prevent falls from occurring. Information on evidence-based falls prevention programs available near you is available from LifeLong Links.

Legal Services


- Legal Assistance: This program serves individuals aged 60 and older by providing legal advice and representation; information and education; and referrals in civil legal matters throughout the state. The program's role is to identify legal problems and legal service needs of older lowans and adults with disabilities, with priority given to those who are most vulnerable due to social and/or economic circumstances. Common legal problems concern housing, consumer fraud, collection, elder abuse/exploitation, Social Security/SSI, Medicare, Medicaid, discrimination, guardianships and conservatorships, advance directives and wills/estates. - Office of Substitute Decision Maker (ODSM): The ODSM strives to enhance the quality of life for Iowans who are not capable of making their own decisions about legal, financial or health care matters. To be eligible, an individual must be an Iowa resident who is at least 18 years old and have no appropriate or responsible person available to serve as a substitute decision maker; or be without adequate resources to compensate a substitute decision maker. The OSDM will only be appointed by the court as the substitute decision maker of last resort. For more information, contact the Iowa Department on Aging at (515)725-3333 or (800)532-3213.



Home Placement Questionnaire (HPQ)

If you receive a Home Placement Questionnaire (HPQ) from an Iowa Department of Corrections prison or work release facility, it means an offender has requested to live at your residence upon his/her release to community-based supervision. It would be the hope that the offender would have notified you of this process and gotten permission from you to live at your residence. If this is not the case and you received the HPQ, you can write on the bottom you do not want the offender living with you and send it back to the address provided. If you do not send the HPQ back, we will assume you do not want the offender to reside with you upon his/her release.

The purpose of the HPQ is to help make accurate and positive recommendations to the Iowa Board of Parole prior to the offender's review by the Board. If the proposed placement is not approved, this process helps facilitate finding an alternative site for the offender to be released in a more timely and efficient manner. The information you fill out on the HPQ will be verified by staff. If false information is provided on the form, this will be cause to deny the proposed placement. Every offender has unique circumstances. If the HPQ is filled out thoroughly and accurately, it does not guarantee the offender will be allowed to reside at the proposed residence. If the residence is denied, the counselor may or may not be allowed to discuss the reasons why. It is dependent on the situation.

Below are two examples of the HPQ to help answer some questions you may have. One is specific to sex offenders. For further questions you may contact the offender's case manager.

We appreciate the support family and friends provide to offenders. The desire of the Iowa Department of Corrections is successful reentry for all offenders.
