




Who Represents You?

- Legislators are generalists; they can see over 1000 bills a year.
- Be a source of knowledge for them.
- It takes 50 to 60 separate contacts with a legislator to make an impact.
- If you don't know something, say so, and then get back to them with the information



Overcoming Glazed Eyes

- Policy change is incremental
- Building relationships matters
- Achieving a short-term goal is just as important as reaching the ultimate goal
- Sometimes Prevention is success

Ethics (Don't Ruin your Career)

- According to IRS definitions, "advocacy" refers to general work that is done for or against a particular issue.
- "Lobbying" is defined by the IRS as attempting to influence legislation.

Rules

- 1. <u>501(c)(3)</u>
 - a. Corporations, funds, or foundations organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, literary, or educational purposes.
 - b. Limited lobbying activities
- 2. <u>501(c)(4)</u>
 - a. Civic leagues/social welfare organizations
 - b. Unlimited lobbying activities
- 3. <u>501(c)(6)</u>
 - a. Associations (NASW), Business leagues/chambers of commerce
 - b. Unlimited lobbying activities
- 4. <u>527</u>
 - a . Political organizations
 - b. Lobbying efforts permissible but may be taxed.

501(c)(3) Organizations CAN:

- Conduct candidate forums/meet the candidate nights with all of the candidates.
- Participate in candidate forums/meet the candidate nights.
- Send surveys/questionnaires to each candidate with a list of important questions.
- Send information on issue(s) to all candidates so that they are informed about what the organization does.

501(c)(3) Organizations CANNOT:

- Show favoritism for one candidate or political party.
- Target voter registration drives, getout-the-vote campaigns, or other efforts at members of a particular political party.
- Provide support (financial or inkind) to a political candidate.
- Coordinate efforts with a candidate or political party.

Indiana Code

- Indiana Code
- <u>Legislative Ethics</u>.Title 2, General Assembly; Article 2.1, Legislative Sessions and Procedures; Chapter 3
- <u>Bribery, Conflict of Interest, and Official</u> <u>Misconduct.</u>Title 35, Criminal Law and Procedure; Article 44, Offenses Against Public Administration; Chapter 1.
- <u>Lobbyists</u>. Title 2, General Assembly; Article 7.
- <u>Ethics and Conflicts of Interest</u>. Title 4, State Offices and Administration; Article 2, State Officers Generally; Chapter 6. (In this section, the term "state officer" does not apply to legislator.)
