

Why NIRS Is Important to the CDD



Reporting to Our Federal Funders: The Administration on Community Living and University Centers of Excellence



- Interdisciplinary pre-service preparation and continuing education
- Research, including basic or applied research, evaluation and public policy analysis
- Information dissemination
- Community services, including direct services (clinical or nonclinical), training, technical assistance and model demonstrations.



The Administration on Community Living, Continued: the DD Network

- Originally authorized by the Mental Retardation Construction Act of 1963; reorganized in the Developmental Disabilities Act of 2000
- State Councils on Developmental Disabilities NM DDPC
 Advocacy, capacity building, systemic change activities 60% consumers
- State Protection and Advocacy programs Disability Rights
 NM
 - Protect rights of persons with DD



Reporting to Our Federal Funders: The Health Resources and Services Administration and LEND



- The CDD is home to one of 43 programs called "Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental and Related Disabilities" or LEND.
- LEND Programs are interdisciplinary leadership training programs funded through HRSA's Maternal Child Health Bureau

- For projects, we select "UCEDD", "LEND" or both in the radio buttons.
 - LEND is selected if at least one person involved is a LEND faculty member or current or former trainee.
 - A list of LEND-affiliated CDD faculty, staff and former trainees is a handout in the Participant Guide.

LEND, Continued





 For projects, activities and products, we select "LEND" as a secondary project if someone from LEND is involved.



Why Is NIRS Important?

- NIRS is the system we use to gather and report on information <u>required</u> by federal agencies including ACL and HRSA.
- Information in NIRS can have an impact on our status as a UCEDD.
- •The Center also uses NIRS for other essential reporting purposes, including our impact in New Mexico in the areas of training, technical assistance, outreach and clinical services and our impact on the field of disability through reports, presentations and articles by Center staff and faculty.
- •This information is critical to documenting the impact of the Center to the SOM, the HSC, UNM and the public.

Who Administers NIRS?





- NIRS is administered by The Association of University Centers on Disability (AUCD).
- •AUCD also uses information about projects in NIRS to promote the network of UCEDDs and LEND programs (e.g., requests from Congress).





A Brief Overview of What's In NIRS: Projects, Activities and Products



NIRS Content: The Project

- •The cornerstone of NIRS is the "project" funded projects given to the Center by any source (state, federal, private).
- Division Directors make decisions about how projects are listed in NIRS.
- •For example, a single, unified project might have two or more funding sources with separate indices.
- •The Division Director makes a decision: is this one project for NIRS purposes, or more than one (by funding source)?





An Example

- The Family and Community Partnerships Division has a project called "Partners for Employment".
- Original funding came from the Health Department (first index).
- The Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR) decided to add funding (second index).
- While there are two funding sources and two indices, the Division Director made the decision that this would be one project for purposes of NIRS.
- For CDD accounting and reporting purposes, it remains two projects.



Project, Continued: What Information is Entered

- Who to contact
- Funding dates, types, sources, amounts
- Core functions
- Areas of emphasis
- Activity Type
- Target audiences
- Unserved and underserved populations
- Collaboration with other agencies
- Consumer participation
- Geographic scope
- General description





- Activities are the individual events or discrete process, pursuits, or functions of a project.
- Activities are linked to a project.
- There may be from one to "X" activities listed for one project.
- New activities can be added to a project at any time.
- Program staff make decisions about how many activities each project has.
- Are there distinct sets of activities within one project that make sense to list out separately?



Projects and Activities: An Example

Project:

Health Promotion and Disease Prevention For People Who Are Paralyzed

Activities:

- Evaluation of Programs of the Reeve Foundation's Paralysis Resource Center
- Peer and Family Support Program Training for Peer Mentors
- National Surveillance on Health and Other Disparities for People Who are Paralyzed
- Development of a National Grant Program for State Technology Assistance Programs
- Quality of Life Grant Program

Activities, Continued: What Information is Entered

- The core function that best describes the activity
- The type of activity
- The area of emphasis the activity addresses
- Numbers, types, and demographics of activity participants
- Collaborators on the activity
- Projects the activities are affiliated with
- Duration and dates of activity



Common Data Elements for Projects and Activities: Core Function

The core function that best describes the overall project and each activity within the project:

- Interdisciplinary Preservice Preparation (Training Trainees)
- Continuing Education/Community Training
- Technical Assistance
- Direct Clinical Services/Model Services
- Other Direct/Model Services
- Demonstration Services
- Performing Research or Evaluation
- Information Dissemination



Common Data Elements, Continued: Activity Type

Projects and every activity except clinical/direct services must have one of three activity types selected:

- Advocacy: active support for a program, initiative, or change
- Capacity Building: strengthening local, state, regional, and national communities
- Systemic Change: modifying entire programs, policies, services, and/or funding streams

Direct Clinical Services/Model Services or Other Direct/Model Services, Direct Service will automatically be selected in the "Type of Activity"



CDD Policies Regarding NIRS

- Entering data in NIRS (projects, activities, products, clinical services, etc.) is mandatory.
- Most data need to be entered on a quarterly basis <u>at a minimum</u>.
- Divisions are responsible for identifying people to collect data for NIRS and enter data in NIRS.
- Everyone collecting or entering data for NIRS must complete a training module on that specific topic.
- User names and passwords are specific to each person, and are distributed after training is completed.


