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
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Impact of the AUCD Network in FY2006: Three Networks of University Centers and Programs Working to Improve the Lives of People with Disabilities and Their Families

The Association of University Centers on Disabilities (AUCD) is a membership organization comprised of three national networks of interdisciplinary, university-based Centers dedicated to research, education, leadership training, policy development, and direct service for people with disabilities, and related centers and entities.

This report provides data and information on work performed in FY2006 and the impact of that work on the lives of people with disabilities by AUCD and the three national networks it supports and represents:



- Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental and Related Disabilities (LEND)
 Programs. The network of LEND programs is funded by the Maternal and Child
 Health Bureau (MCHB) within the Health Resources and Services Administration
 (HRSA). Currently, 35 LENDs operate in 29 states; 31 of the LEND programs are colocated in universities with UCEDDs.
- Developmental Disabilities Research Centers (DDRCs). The network of 19 DDRCs with AUCD membership consists of 14 Centers with current P30 core grant funding from National Institute for Child Health and Human Development (NICHD) and 5 Centers that use alternative funding mechanisms within the National Institutes of Health (NIH) to support projects relevant to intellectual disabilities. Eight of these research centers are co-located in universities with UCEDDs or LENDs.

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The AUCD Network

AUCD

AUCD is a national, 501(c)3 non-profit organization representing three national networks of interdisciplinary, university-based Centers dedicated to research, education, leadership training, policy development, and direct service for people with disabilities. Established in 1971 to represent and support the collective interests of these national networks, AUCD's mission is to advance policy and practice for and with people living with developmental and other disabilities, their families, and communities by supporting its members as they engage in research, policy development, education, and service that further independence, productivity, and a satisfying quality of life. AUCD represents three networks:

UCEDDs

The national network of UCEDDs is authorized under Public Law 106-402 (The Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act of 2000 or "DD Act") and their core funding is administered by ADD. This network of UCEDDs—at least 1 in every US state and territory—provides preservice preparation, performs services (including technical assistance, community education, and direct services), engages in research, and disseminates information. In 2006, ADD designated 3 additional UCEDDs, bringing the network total to 67 Centers.

LENDs

The network of LEND programs is funded by MCHB within the HRSA to ensure that health professionals have the necessary knowledge and skills to address the unique needs of children and adolescents with special health care needs and their families. Currently, 35 LENDs operate in 29 states; 31 of the LEND programs are co-located in universities with UCEDDs.

DDRCs

The network of DDRCs receives funding from the NICHD within NIH. Established by Congress in 1963 as "centers of excellence" for research in mental retardation and developmental disabilities, they represent the nation's first and foremost sustained effort to prevent and treat disabilities through biomedical and behavioral research. The network of 19 DDRCs with AUCD membership consists of 14 Centers with current P30 core grant funding from NICHD and 5 Centers that use alternative funding mechanisms within NIH to support projects relevant to intellectual disabilities. Eight of these research centers are co-located in universities with UCEDDs or LENDs.

AUCD represents three national networks of university-based Centers with complimentary missions.

FY2006 Data from the UCEDD and LEND Networks

Overview

The UCEDDs receive core funding from ADD (as authorized under the DD Act) to (a) provide interdisciplinary pre-service preparation of personnel; (b) provide community services including training, technical assistance, and direct services; (c) conduct research; and (d) disseminate information. UCEDDs fulfill these core functions within the context of eight areas of emphasis related to improving the quality of life for people with developmental disabilities: quality assurance, education and early intervention, child care, health, employment, housing, transportation, and recreation.

The LENDs receive core funding from MCHB (as authorized under Title V of the Social Security Act) primarily to provide long-term training at the graduate and post-graduate levels, with the goal of developing high levels of skill, competence, and leadership in maternal and child health in a diverse workforce that is culturally competent and family centered. Additionally, LENDs generate, translate, and integrate new knowledge to enhance training, inform policy, and improve health outcomes.

Network-wide data collection dates back to 1987. A fully web-based National Information and Reporting System (NIRS) was introduced on August 1, 2002 for the FY2003 data year. Since then, NIRS has undergone a number of iterations to increase its utility to the networks it serves. NIRS currently supports data collection for four networks: UCEDDs, LENDs, Leadership Education in Adolescent Health (LEAHs), and Pediatric Pulmonary Centers (PPCs).

In 2006, there were 64 UCEDDs (at least 1 in every US state and territory) and 35 LENDs. Because 31 LENDs were co-located with UCEDDs, the data from these two networks are presented jointly here.

The following UCEDD and LEND data were obtained from the NIRS web-based database operated by AUCD with financial support from the ADD, MCHB, and the Association itself.*

Network-wide data



Research Data

Each UCEDD and LEND has its own particular research agenda; however, their research typically includes basic or applied research, evaluation, and the analysis of public policy in areas that affect or could affect (either positively or negatively) individuals with developmental disabilities and their families.

In FY2006, UCEDDs and LENDs operated 1,090 projects with a research component, which included:

- Program evaluation
- Investigations into the efficacy of educational, behavioral, health, and technological interventions
- Policy analysis
- Clinical trials



UCEDDs and LENDs *translate research into practice* through the development and dissemination of informative products.

The network produced **4,973 products** in FY2006, which consisted of:

- 841 refereed journal articles
- 896 non-refereed publications (monographs, technical reports, guides, handbooks, whitepapers, etc.)
- 106 books
- 259 book chapters
- 572 technology-based materials (AV materials, software, web portals/websites, etc.)
- 48 doctoral dissertations and master's theses
- 358 periodicals (newsletters, issue briefs, etc.)
- 1,412 public awareness materials (brochures, pamphlets, radio/television interviews, etc.)

The network operated 1,090 projects with a research component in FY2006.

The network produced 4,973 products in FY2006.

Network trainees closely reflect the nation's demographics.

Education Data

Each UCEDD and LEND provides interdisciplinary pre-service preparation and continuing education that serves to expand an individual's professional or academic credentials. Such education usually takes place in an academic setting or program that may (a) lead to the award of an initial academic degree or certificate; (b) include internship, practicum, fellowship, or residency activities; or (c) represent advancement in academic credentials through a course of study.

Trainees are categorized within NIRS by the number of contact hours required to complete their training program. In FY2006, the network provided training to a total of **4,369 students and fellows**, which included 2,540 intermediate (40–299 contact hours) and 1,829 long-term trainees (300+ contact hours). The LEND long-term and intermediate trainees in FY2006 numbered 1,803.



The majority of trainees (59.5%) in FY2006 were between the ages of 21 and 30; female trainees outnumbered males by approximately 4:1 in 2006.


Fully 75% of the network's trainees in 2006 were seeking graduate degrees or were in post-doctoral training positions.

Service Data


Each UCEDD or LEND operates a variety of projects to serve the community. In 2006, such projects included:

- **Technical Assistance**: problem-solving to assist individuals, programs, and agencies in improving their services, management, policies, and/or outcomes.
- **Training**: enhancing the knowledge of community members and/or maintaining the professional credentials of those who directly serve the community.
- **Direct Services**: providing supports or clinical care directly to individuals with developmental disabilities and/or their family members.
- **Demonstration Services**: developing, implementing, and documenting promising practices and supports for individuals with disabilities or special health care needs and their families.

Nearly a third of network projects in FY2006 targeted a regional, national, or international audience.

Scope of Projects

Approximately two-thirds of the FY2006 UCEDD/LEND projects were within a state-based context, however nearly a third of projects directly targeted a regional, national, or international audience.



The table below describes the target populations of network projects in FY2006. Although each project may work with more than one population, 96% of the networks' projects targeted at least one un- or underserved population.

In FY2006, 96% of the UCEDD/LEND projects targeted at least one un- or underserved population.

Technical Assistance and Training

In FY2006, the network provided training and technical assistance to **1,625,450** professionals and paraprofessionals, legislators and policy makers, family members, individuals with disabilities, and the general public.

In FY2006, the network provided training and technical assistance to 1,625,450 individuals.


In FY2006, the network provided clinical services to 146,484 individuals and made 143,947 consults.

Direct and Demonstration Services

Clinical and other direct services are displayed below in a comparative fashion; however, they are not equivalent data elements. *Clinical services* data reflect each individual served in network clinics. In contrast, *other direct services* data reflect the number of consults provided or contacts made rather than the individuals served. In FY2006, the network provided clinical services to **146,484 individuals** and made **143,947 consults** or contacts.


The chart below displays, by ethnicity, the relative percentages of individuals directly served by the network in FY2006. The figures shown reflect the percentages served, by race and ethnicity, for the two types of service. To provide a context, national ethnic population figures (US Census 2000) are provided.

UCEDDs and LENDs serve individuals of minority populations at rates greater than their national prevalence and serve individuals who are White at a rate lower than their national prevalence. As this chart demonstrates, the relative percentages of the individuals served in network clinical services and community contacts in FY2006 are greater than what might be expected given the nation's demographics in several ethnic categories. Although only 30.9% of the US population is *other than* White, 64% of all the clinical clients and 44% of other direct services recipients in FY2006 were individuals who were other than White. In addition, while the 12.5% of the US population is Hispanic (of any race), fully 27% of all clinical clients and 17% of other direct services recipients in FY2006 were Hispanic.



UCEDD/LEND Funding

The DD Act requires that UCEDDs, to the extent possible, utilize the infrastructure and resources obtained through funds made available under the grant to leverage additional public and private funds to successfully achieve project goals. LENDs are not legislatively mandated to leverage funds; however, to effectively operate, LENDs must leverage support from other sources.



In FY2006, total network ADD/MCHB core funding was \$51,217,235, encompassing a total of \$32,600,000 in ADD core grant funding and \$18,617,235 in MCHB core grant funding.

The UCEDD/LEND network has been **very successful in leveraging** core grant funds over the past several years. For each ADD/MCHB core grant dollar, the network generated:

- \$8.43 in FY2006
- \$6.54 in FY2005
- \$6.40 in FY2004
- \$6.22 in FY2003

These leveraging efforts would not be possible without the stable and consistent role that the core funding from ADD and MCHB plays in building the capacity of the UCEDD and LEND networks.

Data on the DDRC Network

The network of 19 DDRCs with AUCD membership consists of 14 Centers with current P30 core grant funding from NICHD (within NIH) and 5 Centers that use alternative funding mechanisms within NIH to support MRDD-relevant projects. Eight of these research centers are co-located in universities with UCEDDs or LENDs.

The information below is summarized from *Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities* (*MRDD*) *Branch NICHD Report to the NACHHD* [National Advisory Child Health and Human Development] *Council* (2005, June). Washington, DC.

Education

DDRCs provide invaluable research training, mentoring, and support through mechanisms such as:

- Pre-Doctoral Fellowships
- Post-Doctoral Fellowships
- Independent Scientist Awards
- Mentored Clinical Scientist Development Awards
- Mentored Research Career Development Awards
- Mid-Career Investigator Awards
- Institutional Training Programs

Research

Although Centers differ in many respects, each DDRC supports 40–100 Research Projects and 20–70 Principal Investigators on an annual basis. DDRCs are engaging in research to advance the understanding of:

- **Chromosomal conditions** that *cause* intellectual disabilities, such as Prader-Willi Syndrome, Angelman Syndrome, Williams Syndrome, and Down Syndrome.
- Other conditions that are *characterized by* intellectual disabilities.
- **X chromosome disorders** that *result in* intellectual disabilities, such as Rett Syndrome and Fragile X Syndrome.
- **Biochemical processes and metabolic issues** that are *related to* brain functioning, brain injury, or long-term consequences to the brain, such as hypoxia, very low birth weight, PKU and other metabolic disorders, and prenatal malnutrition.
- **Biological or biochemical mechanisms** that *cause* behavioral characteristics, such as those found in Autism Spectrum Disorders, self-injurious behavior, and impairments in language development.

Many DDRCs host "centers within centers" with specific research foci that contribute to and enrich the larger network. Current centers within centers funded by NIH are:

- Three Fragile X Syndrome Research Centers (FXSRCs)
- Two Rare Disease Cooperative Research Centers (RDCRCs)
- Eight Collaborative Programs of Excellence in Autism (CPEAs)
- Five Studies to Advance Autism Research and Treatment (STAART) Centers


Service

DDRCs contribute to the development and implementation of evidence-based practices by evaluating the effectiveness of biological, biochemical, and behavioral interventions; developing assistive technologies; and advancing prenatal diagnosis and newborn screening.

AUCD Return to Its Membership

The following figures display the amount that AUCD has returned to its member Centers and Programs through subcontracts, sub-awards, consultant fees, and reimbursement for travel.
