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HCBS Settings Rule

What is the Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) Settings Rule?

In 2014, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) issued the HCBS Settings Rule to require that every state ensure that services delivered to seniors and people with disabilities living in the community – outside of institutions – meet minimum standards for integration, access to community life, choice, autonomy, and other important consumer protections.

HCBS Settings Rule

What is the Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) Settings Rule?

Maximizes the opportunities for HCBS program participants **to have access to the benefits of community living** and to receive services in the most integrated setting

Full compliance with all requirements by March 17, 2023.



Significance to UCEDDs

An opportunity to translate our work into practice

Creates a Pathway Self-Determination

 Opens a pathway for individuals with disabilities to articulate their wishes hopes and desires and have these reinforced.

Protections and Rights

 Sets forth very specific requirements for Waiver-funded settings





Significance to UCEDDs

An opportunity to translate our work into practice

Quality Improvements

- Opportunity to ensure person-centeredness
- CMS has processes in place to appeal denial of services, but how do participants submit their concerns about service delivery?

Stakeholder Engagement

- CMS requires states to take public comments, submit these to CMS and respond to each comment
- Allows for a counter-check of agreement with compliance on Settings between state leadership and stakeholders





Implementation

Services

- Participate in stakeholder calls
- Monitor waiver renewals and make public comment
- Dissemination/Technical Assistance
 - Best Practices
 - Person-Centered Plans
 - Increasing number and training for direct care providers





Implementation

Training/Education

- Teach individuals receiving services about their rights
- Educate families
- Train provider staff/agencies on how to implement rule

Research

- Evaluate impact of rule (Quality of life improvements?)
- Identify trends on violations





The Heightened Scrutiny Process





Process

1. CMS schedules Heightened Scrutiny Visits



Reach out to you to identify UCEDD staff, self-advocate, family leader

2. ACL hosts stakeholder calls prior to visit



UCEDD representation

3. Stakeholder Call with CMS



What settings need heightened scrutiny-even if they aren't in State Transition Plans?

- 4. CMS leadership has Heightened Scrutiny visit
- 5. Stakeholder Recap Call after Heightened Scrutiny visits


