CHOICES

CHOICES is a program for women who are not pregnant (but could become pregnant) and who are drinking alcohol at risky levels. It is an evidence-based intervention (i.e., based on activities that research has shown to be valid and effective) that helps women to reduce or stop drinking, use contraception (birth control) effectively, or both. CHOICES uses motivational interviewing to increase a woman's motivation and commitment to change.
