

In the Year Two Thousand and Seven

An Act to establish self determination for persons with disabilities.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 Chapter 19B of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting 2 after section 18 the following section:
- Section 19:-
- 4 (A) The department shall develop recommendations for the 5 implementation of a self-determination model of funding services 6 and supports that provides the ability for an individual receiving
- 7 services and supports to personally control, with appropriate assistance, a targeted amount of dollars; the model shall include, but is
- 9 not limited to, the following: 10 1 The ability to establish
- The ability to establish an individual rate or budget for each
 person;
- 12 2. Mechanisms to ensure that each participant has the support and 13 assistance necessary to design and implement a package of services
- 14 and supports unique to the individual;





Our Start

- **2012**
- Self Advocacy Summit in Seattle put on by Administration on intellectual and Developmental Disabilities and The Administration for Community Living.
- ► The Seattle Summit was one of many in the Country
- Self advocates and partners came from multiple states came together to promote self advocacy.
- Washington State Summit team was led by self advocates from multiple organizations.
- Our focus was to improve the lives of people with developmental disabilities

Why we Continued

- We wanted to change the power dynamics in our state.
- We wanted more people with developmental disabilities to have more leadership opportunities.
- We wanted people with developmental disabilities to have more choice and control over their lives.
- We wanted to bring more power to self advocacy organizations.
- We wanted to create a values statement that talks about our rights.
- ▶ After two years this values statement became

A Proclamation for the Dignity and Rights of all Human Beings

The proclamation has the following key components

- We have the right to grow and develop to our full potential
- 2. We have the right to live free from abuse, neglect and exploitation
- 3. We have the right to access all aspects of our communities.
- 4. We have the right to make any and all decisions that affect our lives

Proclamation Highlights Continued

- 5. We have the right to be treated with value and respect like all human beings.
- 6. We have the right to lead full meaningful lives.
- 7. We have the obligation to help others as they learn and fight for these rights.

The Proclamation was written for all Human Beings including people with disabilities.

Equal Partners Interstate Congress (EPIC)

- **2014-2017**
- ▶ Partnership between Nevada, Idaho, Wyoming, Alaska
- Allies provided technical support to EPIC states and helped put on two Summits
- Goal 1: Increase Self Advocacy involvement in each state
- Goal 2: Provide EPIC states money, so they could build the infrastructure possible to sustain their self advocacy organizations.
- ▶ Goal 3: Start the conversation about creating a 4th Developmental Disability Network Partner headed by self advocates dedicated to promoting the Civil Rights of People with Developmental Disabilities.

Allies 2.0

- ▶ 2017-Future
- Allies became the 4th Network Partner in Washington State
- We participate in quarterly meetings with the other three partners
- We work with our partners on a variety of issues including stopping abuse and neglect, eliminating sub minimum wage practices and increasing people's access to assistive technology.
- We became a State Non Profit
- ▶ We are working on federal paperwork, so we can become a federal non profit.

Why Allies? Why a 4th Network Partner? Why Now?

We believe a 4th Network Partner is important now because:

- 1. People with developmental disabilities deserve to be equal partners with power in the disability movement.
- 2. Self Advocates are the best ones to empower others with developmental disabilities to take charge of their lives.
- 3. Self Advocates must be at the table when changes to policies and programs happen.
- 4. Self Advocates need to take the lead on making our communities more inclusive.

Allies plans for the Future

- Stop subminimum wage practices in Washington State
- Make sure all communities in Washington State are open and welcoming to people with developmental disabilities.
- Work with our state Developmental Disability Ombudsman to eliminate instances of abuse, neglect or exploitation.
- 4. Work to empower people with developmental disabilities to live full meaningful lives.
- 5. Work with other states to officially create a 4th network partner.

- ► For Self Advocates: Stand up and take more leadership in the disability movement.
- ▶ **For Families:** Support the self advocacy movement as it grows. We want to work hand in hand with families to make our lives better.

Keys to the Waiting List

- Set up table just outside House Chambers
- Delivered the Keys with limited explanation
 - Invited legislators and staff back to the table
 - Person at the table to talk numbers and data
- Campaign from home
 - Call
 - Email
 - □ Fax
 - Mail Postcards

Opening the Discussion

- From Keying the Capitol to invitation to talk about the issues
- Relationships built
- Training requested for all legislators
- Found buy-in from key Legislators or "Gatekeepers"
- Personal invitation to training

Outcomes of Waiting List Caucus

- Most if not all legislators know about DD services and the Waiting List
- Creation of the first HCBS Waiver to help support people on the Waiting List (last created DD Waiver 1998)
- Largest one-time appropriation to work the Waiting List

Lessons Learned

- Don't be good at the same thing
- Agree on the outcomes; negotiate the methods
- Bring one alone
- Have mentors outside the movement
- Don't dilute the advocacy with multiples issues
- Careful and temporary alliances with other groups
- Tend to one another
