

## Inclusive Dormitory Living

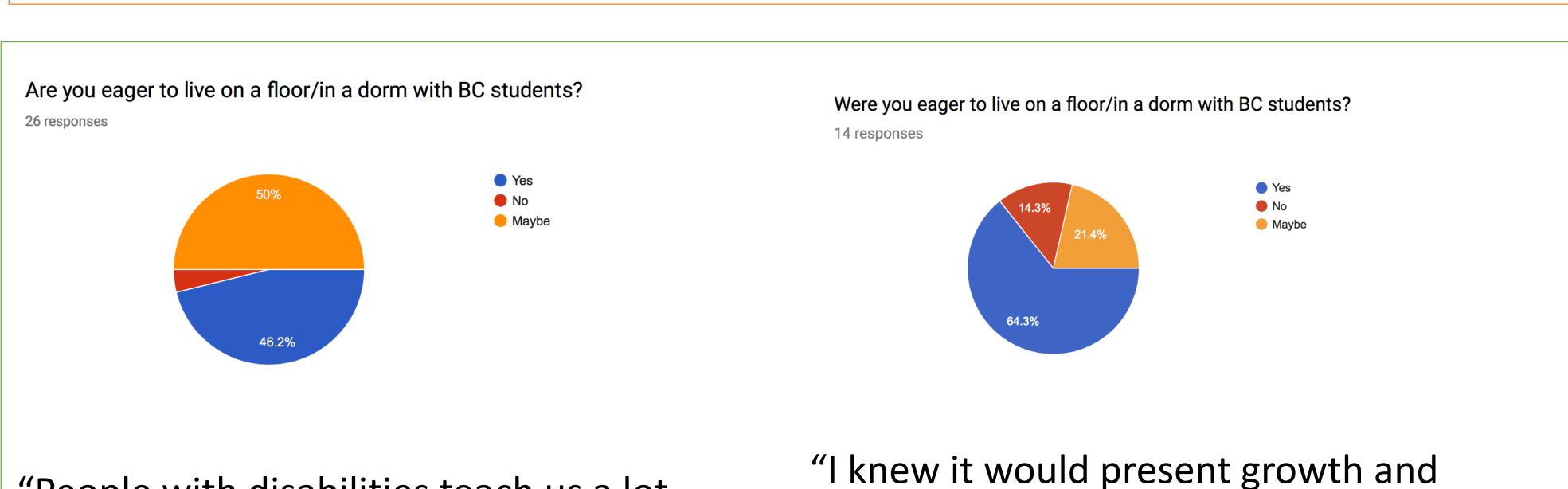


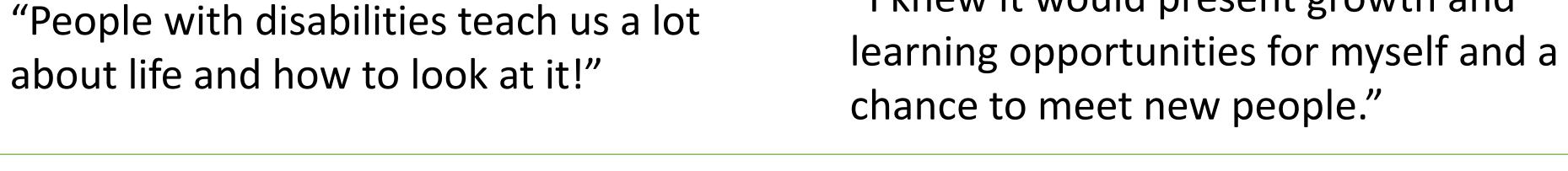

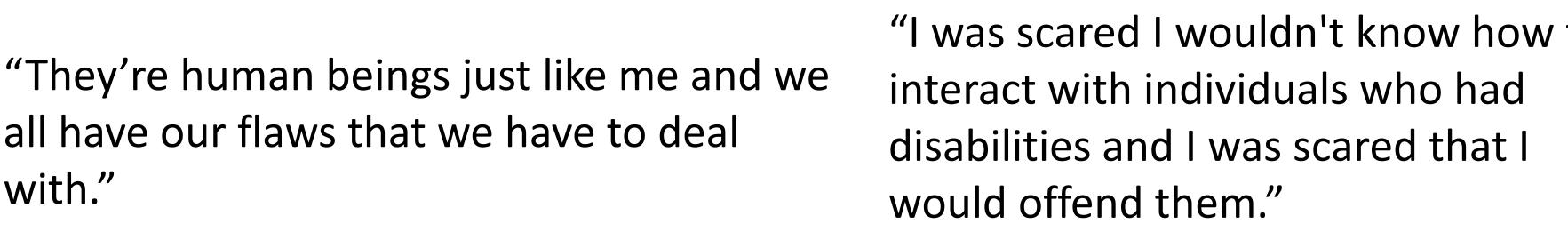
Research Question: Does dormitory living in an inclusive college dormitory environment impact traditional college students' beliefs about people with disabilities, and did they learn from their peers with disabilities?

The population of students sampled were traditional college students without disabilities who lived on an inclusive integrated dormitory floor with students with intellectual disabilities attending a two-year postsecondary college program, on the campus of a private university. Students were surveyed at the beginning and end of the academic year. Data was collected via an online pre- and post-survey. Responses were compiled and categorized, common responses counted and final survey results compared to identify areas of growth and weakness. Results were reviewed to identify important beliefs and influences of inclusive dormitory living, and topics for further research.



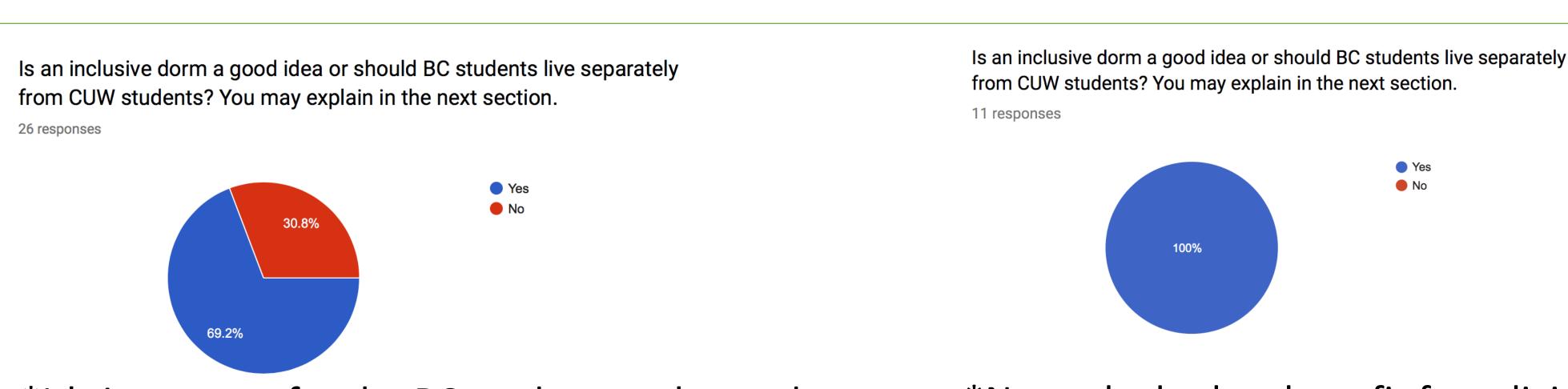




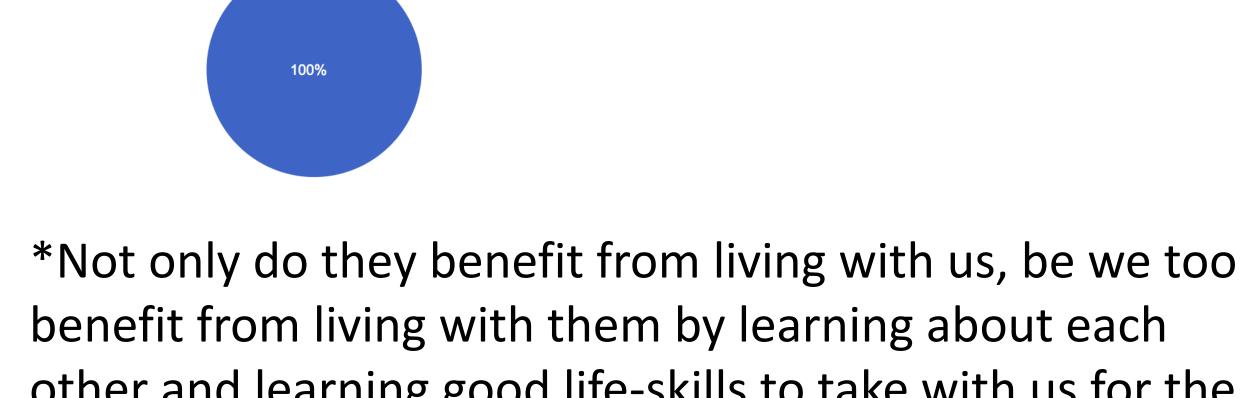


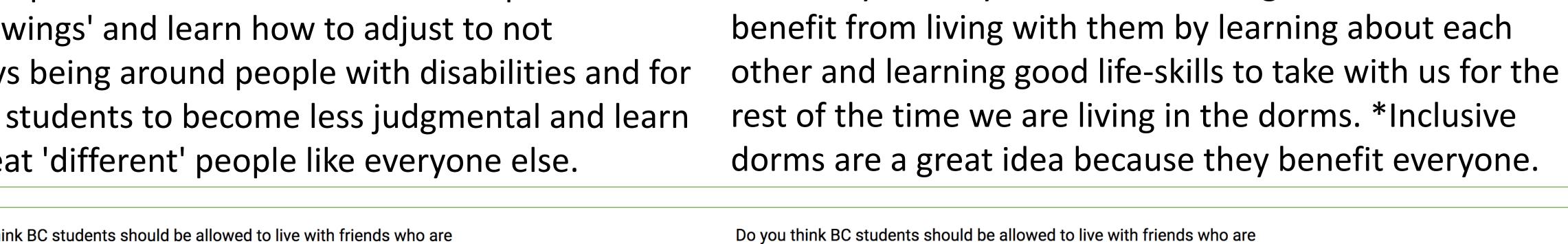


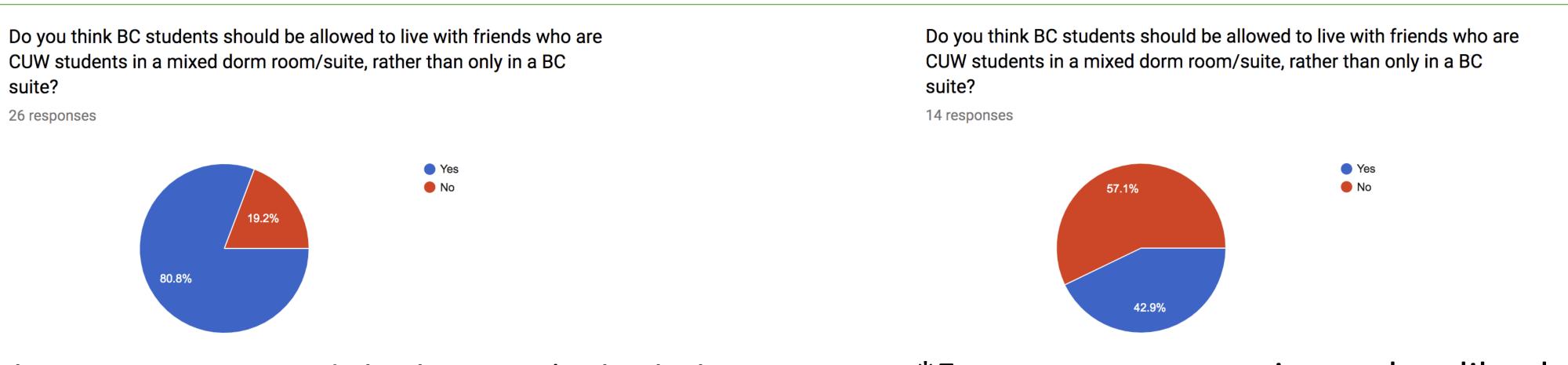
