

OUTCOMES

Peer to Peer Support Circle Hawaii For Adults with Disabilities

Center on Disability Studies (CDS)
University of Hawai'i at Mānoa

Purpose:

Support the well-being & self-advocacy of adults with disabilities through a peer-led support group.

What we plan to do:

- Monthly peer-led support group on O'ahu.
- Provide a safe space for sharing experiences and resources.
- Train peer facilitators so the groups can continue over time.



Project HEAL



- Project HEAL (Health, Education, Advocacy, and Law) at Kennedy Krieger Institute is a comprehensive medical-legal partnership (MLP) within the Maryland Center for Developmental Disabilities, which is Maryland's designated University Center for Excellence (UCEDD).
 - Project HEAL is the only MLP in the nation affiliated with a UCEDD.
- Project HEAL attorneys provide advocacy and civil legal services (special education matters, SSI and SSDI, adult guardianship and less restrictive alternative matters) to patients and their families.
- Project HEAL recently celebrated its 20th anniversary!
- Project HEAL (Health, Education, Advocacy, and Law)



Family Advocacy Network (FAN)

Empowering families and students to actively engage in the development and meaningful

implementation of Individualized Education Programs

- □ 108 families/668 hours technical assistance (July 24 June 25)
- ☐ 473 professionals reached and 3 pilot family cohorts started
- ☐ Received 60% number of referrals of all last year

Goals



Retrospective Review

211 records analyzed to understand population, identify barriers and facilitators to successful community intergration



Prospective Pilot

Strengths based, interdisciplinary, transitional team moves with individuals across systems, goal of 20 participants

IDD in the Criminal Legal System

- Over-represented
- Cycles of trans-institutionalization and long-term involuntary commitment
- High rates of co-occurring mental illness, substance use challenges, and unstable housing

Preliminary Findings


- 12 enrolled participants

- Systemic barriers are pervasive and siloed care impedes reentry


